1. Aims and Scope

This unit deals with the theoretical and methodological shifts in the history of women from its beginnings until today. It highlights the coining of the term 'Gender' as a key concept for historical analysis (Scott 1986). In addition, it focuses on the analysis of the most relevant historical processes regarding gender relations, while taking into account the role played by women within various historical contexts, special attention being paid to the late modern era.

2. Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs)

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify the social, economic, cultural and political aspects within the history of women and gender relations.
- 2. Establish links between the diacronic structure of the historical processes regarding the history of women and gender relations, taking into account the various geographical and chronological contexts.
- 3. Locate the key bibliographical sources on any given topic related to the history of women and gender relations and critically analyse their main contributions.
- 4. Select the relevant information from primary sources regarding the history of women.
- 5. Analyse the relationships between men and women through history and their evolution, as well as the role played by the patriarchal system within any given society.
- 6. Plan and write an essay which summarises the key ideas on a given topic within the history of women.
- 7. Present arguments on a given topic about the history of women.
- 8. Analyse the theoretical framework of feminism within the Western world, as well as its contribution to social progress.
- 9. Know and differenciate between the various historiographical approaches to the history of women.
- 10. Develop a critical approach to the analysis of contemporary societies regarding fundamental rights and equality between men and women.
